## WDTC TWINSHOCK MASTERS & BREAKUP WEEKEND

Former two time champion Mitch Green riding a Honda narrowly missed out on making it three taking second place after a countback of cleans. Much to the delight of the twin shock diehards a new name was added to the trophy and Bradley Bryant riding a TY 175 was crowned the 2015 champion. In other parts of the park some epic battles were also taking place. Classic B competitors Bill Aland and Robert Eyres stayed clean all day and forced each other into a ride off. Well, everyone believed it was a ride off until the truth came out and we learned they actually tossed a coin to decide the result. Some of the other riders had no interest in the scoreboard. David Lahey and Rob Wager decided to use a few of the machines from Davids stable of twin shocks and indulged in a bike swapping party.
