They're open for both the Twin Shock and the regular state round right now, get on it! Cut off will be the Friday night before at 8pm so those who have to do the paperwork side of it don't have to do that while getting ready for the events.

Jericho

It's history time! Jericho, as most people would know, is a very biblical name, and it's on the banks of the Jordan River. The story goes that a soldier and a convict were ordered to go shoot kangaroos for food and guard local shepherds. Obviously when you're given this task, you need to carry some books with you, and they had a Bible and a copy of The Arabian Nights and took turns naming geographical features from each book in turn. These guys knew how to have fun.

Jericho was first founded in 1816 and was an important stop for horses and coaches between Hobart and Launceston. The town is one of the oldest townships in Australia, the post office first opened in 1832 and closed in 1962. In 1840, the Probation Station was built, which was home to over 200 convicts who worked on the original highway between Hobart and Launceston. The paddocks next to the Probation Station were

originally known as Fourteen Mile Plain and was the site of the first horse race in Tasmania way back in April of 1826. St James Anglican church was built in 1888 and within its grounds contains the grave of Tasmania's first Victoria Cross recipient, Trooper John Hutton Bisdee. If that last name is familiar, our recent Melton Mowbray trial was held on Bisdee Tier. There's still examples of convict construction in the area, not only buildings, there's also bridges and culverts.

Finally, Jericho is also the venue of the great VW van bogging of one Mr Nathan Purdon, who ventured along the track and appeared to be about a meter too far to the right, causing the van to bog to the axles. The mud itself was so sticky and deep that even with a bunch of people pushing, the van couldn't break free. Thankfully, Mike Amey's discovery of a snatch strap on the side of the highway earlier in the day, lifespan unknown, was put to use and Daniel Fenton plucked the van free.

As Chris mentioned earlier, this was a new area at the popular and well ridden site. All the rain has given most of the state a lush green look, and our event was no exception. Sections 1, 2 and 3 were all almost side by side, and at first everyone had the same thought, that the ground would dig up and make the sections very boggy and hard to ride. Wrong! They stayed pretty well as the day started with only the normal amount of wear and tear. It was a bit of a blast along the waterlogged paddocks to get to the tight, snotty section 4, then drop down to section 5 with the super tricky C+ layout. Another bit of a ride to section 6 which had plenty of different options, then dart up, down, up and across the rock ledge of section 7.

Sub junior had one rider, Cooper, aboard his birthday present, an Oset 16. He quickly adapted to the bigger wheels and more power and won. He also rode a Clubman section and cleaned it, and we haven't stopped hearing about it since. Rumour has it, he'll be moving to Junior next year, though he did tell me he wants to try C+.

Junior had three riders, Max Goodall looking confident on the Honda to take the win. Chris Dillon did a heap of work on Ned's bike and Ned backed it up with a solid second place. Meredith picked up third on the little JR50.

Clubman also had three riders. Will Delanty put in a solid effort to finish third, Stevie Homan picked up two costly fives to get second place. Millie Lockhart barely put a foot wrong all day... actually only three times, all on the first lap and took a deserving win.

Mick Luscombe was our sole twinshock rider, maybe Melrose will inspire a few more to get aboard the older machinery? He won!

C Grade was super tight at the top. Mike Travica dropped a point on his first section of the day, decided he didn't like that and that was that, he won with one point lost. Proving that a cherry ripe and Coke during the rider briefing does actually improve your riding was me, Samuel, finishing second, just one point ahead of a resurgent Mike Hull.

C+. Thanks for making it hard for us. Basically, we don't know who won. Four riders finished on 8 points. On countback, Shane Bayes finished fourth with 27 cleans, Nigel finished third on 29 cleans. All good, no worries. But Simon Langworthy and Nobby Gabbedy made our lives hard and my tallying of the championship even harder by being unsplittable, both finishing on 8 points, 29 cleans, 5 ones, no twos, and 1 three. Ian Pickering has informed me that both riders will have to do a ride off at Melrose. I've not seen one of these before and it will have championship ramifications. Cool!

Zak Lunn put in a stellar ride to finish with one point lost, winning B grade. Peter Lockhart turned up for the first time since the Tas Titles and showed he's still got it, 7 points lost, second place ahead of Callum Millar.

Apologies for the mistake in the results on site, Jordan Perkins finished third in A grade, just behind Will Thornbury, who was just one point off the winner, evergreen Matt Woodhouse.

Tom Woodhouse rode the huge Expert stuff to get second, Chris put on an aerial display on a couple of the big rocks and won.
