There were good numbers at the Melton Mowbray trials and we nearly had observers on most sections. It's very exciting and enjoyable to see some new faces at every event that we hold. #### **Melton Mowbray**

Lovely Banks Road. What a venue. Obviously, no site is perfect, but for spectators, you can't beat this site, and we had quite a few turn up for a look. The car park is a cramped affair, but having a reasonably flat strip with sections either on it or falling away from it makes it a) easy for spectators and b) easy for the kids to get around.

As for stuff to ride on, well, there's heaps. Logs are few and far between but there's rocks. Lots of rocks. Little wobbly wheel catchers, big flat rocks, decent sized triangles, huge blocks which look like they've been deliberately cut into cubes, everything. And, watch where you're riding, there's a couple of areas which are all glass and metal scraps.

I'll be honest, I'm a bit late writing this so my memory of sections isn't that great, so I might be a bit off. Section one though, a long entry, a log and a bunch of rocks, a bit of a ride over some neutral territory to get to the rocks at the end. Section two, made tighter at the start to avoid a bit of a rubbish pile, a couple of 'get it spot on or else' bits, one for A grade and the tall tree stump for Expert. Come out of there, go to three, ride in, choose from a bunch of different lines to get down the bottom, climb back up to get out. Four, start down the bottom, blast up the hill, it's pretty technical through the middle of the section, especially that tiny kink for C grade over a rock you wouldn't think twice about, Expert had some big blocks too, then ride out. Section five looked fairly harmless but that little ride beside the big bar-catching rock took a fair few points. Nigel Munday had a huge off in this section, he almost missed a marker, pulled it back, made it then went fair over the bars and went for six, blood coming out some cuts on his nose and in a fair bit of

pain. Hopefully you're feeling better now though. Section six, nothing big, more technical stuff, pretty similar to section four in terms of layout in a way. Finally, seven, that C grader rock at the start and the couple that followed, if it flowed it felt heavenly, nothing huge in this one, it's almost all back to your basic techniques for turning.

We had one Junior rider, Cooper Lockhart, he rode well and keeps telling me he's doing Clubman next year. I'm not sure if that'll happen, but if it does I might get a break from the 'I won Dad, you didn't, I must be better than you' that I hear after each event.

Clubman was tight. Rosie Viney in third, one point ahead of Will Delanty, the master of the momentum building run up for sections which start on the side of a hill. Braith Lunn lost two points, only one less than Alysha Lunn in second. Look out C grade, it won't be long.

No twin shock riders, the Woodberry's bikes had a case of the 'don't wannas' and caused both riders to DNS.

Third to ninth was covered by just 8 points in C grade, so any errant foot could have dropped you down the order pretty fast. Mike Travica doesn't have to worry about that, comfortably winning ahead of returned rider Daniel Butterworth. Samuel Lockha...oh, me, yeah, I finished third.

C+. Making my scoring spreadsheet and championship scoring difficult, Simon Langworthy and Chello just copied each other, unsplittable scores, I'm begging you all, please don't do this. If you think you're going to be the same as someone else, just put your foot down and take one for the team. Anyway, I hear a rumour that a young C+ rider will be on a brand new bike very soon. This rumour came to me from the young rider in question, so I'm confident it's correct. Jack Salter finished third, only just behind Shane Bayes. Ossa Academy star Ian Pickering put on an absolute blinder and lost just four points to take the figurative gold medal.

Scores were a bit more spread out in B grade. Kalam Langwothy finished third, Peter Lockhart finished second while Zak Lunn just keeps on dominating, cruising to a win.

I barely saw any A graders ride. I know Daniel Fenton buggered his knee, hopefully that's recovered. Jordan Perkins blitzed the field, comfortably taking the win ahead of Will Thornbury and Kurt Pickering.

Expert, they had some hard stuff. Tom finished second, Chris looking comfy on the TRS for the win.

I just realized, if I got Dad to ride an event, we could have five Lockharts riding. Does anyone know the record for most family members? Bayles or Langworthys would be front runners for that, surely.

#### Scottish Trial, Middle Park, Antill Ponds

We had a very short turn around between Melton Mowbray and our Scottish event, due to lambing at the Antill Ponds property. These events are meant to be fundraisers to get our guys and girls over to the Trials des Nations events, but, you know, global problems with a virus and all, they're not going this year.

Anyway, for those that aren't aware how these things work, it's pretty simple. Those from the old days would remember that we didn't have little coloured triangles, we had what were basically garden stakes with painted tops to mark the gate to go through, white for the left, red for the right. It's the same idea, albeit modernized, wire with cool flag plastic flags on top, section entrance shown with green markers. Ride in, pass through the gates, done. Sounds simple and for the Scottish, it could be as easy or as hard as you want, you can challenge yourself and ride the big rock step, or take the simple route around it, as long as you're between the flags you're ok. You'll still lose points the regular ways but with only 15 sections total, you probably don't want to lose too many.

We started the day, some driving further than others after missing the turn off, by splitting into two groups. Kurt guided the first group, Chris the second. You couldn't really head out by yourself like normal, the loop was 20 kilometers and they'd set the sections so obviously they knew where they were. None of the sections were big, they were all C or C+ level but like I said before, you could make it hard if you wanted.

Sections varied a lot, some were moss covered rocks and tree roots, there was a great little creek section, a literal drain up the side of the track, jumbles of fist to small dog sized rocks (it's a new unit of measurement I just invented) in paddocks, lumpy ground with tight turns and finishing off with a hillclimb covered in those sorts of things. Hillclimbs mean a bit of hard work to walk the section, Mick Luscombe yelled out from about half way up to the guys at the top and asked if they were at the end, they yelled back that they were, wicked, stuff walking, it's easier to ride.

If we're back here again, I can highly recommend it, although standing up for 20km wasn't exactly the best for a sprightly start to Monday morning. Yes, the sections are great, but the different landscapes and the views were great. From the open paddocks to plantation forest, complete with herd of deer (of course I've heard of deer, look, there's a group of them there), there was heaps to see. The view especially, seeing the side of the Central Highlands, all the way around to somewhere way out to the east, bloody beautiful. And as a complete treat for the geek in me, we rode along and saw warning signs, directly below us was the gas pipeline which runs north to south, which also has the fibre optic cable buried with it. If you were in Southern Tasmania doing anything online on Sunday 1st of August at about 2pm, there were trials bikes riding above your data packets.

I didn't see anything of the second group, but I do know there was a very healthy rivalry between Daniel and Chris, so much so that Daniel entered initially on a Honda Bayleseaster 125, although he actually rode an older Beta on the day. Our own group had a lot of fun, and a heap of laughs and I've gotta say there were some unreal examples of riding from young Will Delanty, and some excellent rolling drag races between him and Millie. Ned Dillon was, I think, the only bike casualty for the day, a snapped chain, the little TTR50 must be pumping out some big grunt! It's also pretty interesting to know that everyone except one, the shared Sherco riding each section twice by the Clarks, rode the entire event on just one tank of fuel. Decent effort and I'm going to guess my bike wasn't the only one with absolutely stuff all left in the tank. Even Will's little 50, revving its head off all day, still did it on just one tank.

Anyway, results are further down the page, and while going over this just now before publishing the newsletter, I've noticed that 15 and 14 aren't in the right order but I've been away from home for the last two nights working in Launceston, Devonport and Burnie, I want to get this newsletter out so I'm not fixing it.

All in all, brilliant event, come along to the next one, you won't regret it at all.

### Brass Monkey Ride - 7-8th August 2021

This year's addition the 7<sup>th</sup> after a break last year was another fantastic weekend hosted by Tim and Vonette Mead at their ever-expanding property in Moina. Tim is currently in the midst of constructing a new southern wing.

Sunday morning was kicked off with a fine breakfast from the multi-talented Mick Luscombe ably assisted by Tim. With energy stores replenished we then headed for a ride past Lake Cethana, Erriba, crossing the Wilmot river and back over the Bald Hill and past Lake Gairdner.

It's always worth asking the locals when travelling for the hot tips and if you're in the Moina area both Tim and Vonette highly recommend the Cradle Forest Inn located in the Moina township proper for a feed at Feathers bistro and a few local vinos. Freshly made Rissoles and the Hawaiian Parmigiana are top picks on the menu.
